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## RCEN Gathers in Montreal

On September 22-25, the Canadian Environmental Network (RCEN) held its annual General Assembly and conference, focused on Energy and Climate Change. Yvonne Hanson and Randy Flemming attended from Saskatchewan. The Canadian Environmental Network (RCEN) had prepared a draft White Paper on Climate Change and Energy in preparation for the United Nations Climate Change Conference and First Meeting of the Parties to the Kyoto Protocol (COP-11), to be held in Montreal from 28 November to 9 December 2005. The report was used by RCEN members at the Annual Conference to stimulate discussion on climate change and energy issues, especially the long-term role and strategy Canada should take on these issues beyond 2012. It is intended that the White Paper be presented to Environment Minister Stéphane Dion and as the ENGO position at COP-11. Other speakers at this year's conference included Charles Caccia, Pablo Espinoza (Institute of Ecological Policy in Chile), Roger Peters (Pembina Institute & former resident of Saskatoon), Nashima Tariff (Toxics Watch Society), Ousmane Ouatra (Coordinator of the Management Section of Natural resources in Mali).

The General Assembly moved two bylaw changes for the inclusion of youth into the Board of Directors and National Council of the RCEN.

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### Special Note of Congratulations to Lynn Oliphant

One year ago, SEN was congratulating Lynn Oliphant on his nomination for a Canadian Environment Award. Today we can congratulate him on the fact he was selected as the Sustainable Living Gold Award recipient. Lynn received his award in June in Toronto at a gala hosted by Canadian Geographic Magazine. Lynn graciously donated the \$5,000 to SEN for our continued work in capacity building and networking with our member groups.

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# SASKATCHEWAN LAUNCHES CONSULTATIONS ON BUILDING A GREEN STRATEGY

On September 6<sup>th</sup>, at the sight of Hitachi Canada's wind power assembly yard in Saskatoon, the department of Saskatchewan Environment (S.E.) launched the second phase of its Green Strategy for Saskatchewan. The first phase consisted of informal discussion with over 75 external organizations and businesses across the province representing economic, social and environmental interests and occurred in 2004.

Phase two began in late September and will consist of six forums to be held across the province. Each Green Forum will have an evening session, open to the public. The next day will focus on discussions with invited stakeholders. The sessions revolve around the province. The following is a list of the topics, guest speakers for the forums and the cities in which the events are held:

- **Reduced Waste and Waste Management - Yorkton** (September 21-22). Forum Speaker: Nick Aubry, an Environmental Manager with Sony Canada Ltd., and Catherine McCarthy from the resource Recovery Fund Board Nova Scotia. The Workshop will discuss the challenges of waste minimization and waste management in Saskatchewan, including public access to recycling and waste disposal programs, roles and responsibilities and full cost analysis related to generation and management of solid waste.
- **Water Stewardship - Moose Jaw** (October 11-12). Forum Speaker - Professor Dan Shrubsole, University of Waterloo. Participants at the Workshop will review a draft set of Integrated Water Management Principles and recommend future actions to protect and manage the water supply.
- **Parks and Representative Areas - North Battleford** (October 17-18). Forum Speaker - Craig R. Groves, Director of the Greater Yellowstone Program with the Wildlife Conservation Society in Bozeman, Montana. The Workshop will highlight the progress in building Saskatchewan's

Representative Areas Network and look at how to complete and manage it. Future directions for provincial parks and their role in a sustainable and prosperous economy will also be discussed.

- **Human Society and the Environment - Regina** (October 19-20). Forum Speaker - Dr. Ray Copes, Director of Environmental Health at B.C.'s Centre for Disease Control and Dr. David Pimentel, Professor of Insect Ecology & Agricultural Sciences, Cornell University. The Workshop will focus on the provincial priorities needed to ensure human health and the environment are being protected in our communities now and into the future while sustaining strong economic growth.
- **Stewardship of Renewable Natural Resources - Prince Albert** (October 25-26). Forum Speaker - Dr. Peter Duinker, Director, School of Resource and Environmental Studies, Dalhousie University. The Workshop will discuss managing and sharing resources, how resources can best serve society and the balance of social, economic and environmental benefits.
- **Green Economy and Innovation - Saskatoon** (November 2-3). Forum Speaker is Hunter Lovins, President and founder of Natural Capitalism Inc., Professor of Sustainability at Presidio World College. Workshop participants will look at ways to ensure environmental protection, different regulatory options and explore opportunities for expanding green businesses as well as green opportunities for all businesses.

# WHO ARE THE ENVIRONMENTAL CHAMPIONS?

## SEN's Centennial Project

Saskatchewan people and organizations have made major contributions to Canada in the fields of land conservation, natural history, land ethics, environmental protection and sustainable development. Many of these contributions remain unrecognised and unheralded both in Saskatchewan and in Canada as a whole.

The Saskatchewan Eco-Network's **Centennial Environmental Champions project** will draw together the many historical threads of these achievements and champions to produce an educational website and timeline poster as a valuable historical resource to schools, libraries and citizens across Canada.

In addition to highlighting Saskatchewan success stories, it will also provide an excellent review of a century of environmental challenge and innovation at a time when Canadians are faced with developing new models of sustainability. It will provide a unique perspective on the history of Saskatchewan that combines the arts, sciences and the convictions of individuals and groups working together co-operatively to honour and preserve our natural heritage.

So, who are Saskatchewan's environmental champions? Grey Owl, Anahareo, J. Stan Rowe, Wallace Stegner, Farley Mowat? Nominations have been coming in from across the province and country for this project. Nominees will have made a significant contribution in areas such as ecology, agriculture, forestry, environmental management, education, natural history, writing and the arts, social or technological innovations, or alternative ways of living.

The selected nominees will be included on a web site celebrating Saskatchewan's Centennial Year. This exciting initiative has been funded by the Department of Canadian Heritage through the Alberta-Saskatchewan Centennial Initiative and by



Saskatchewan Environment. Environmental freelance journalists Paul Hanley and Robert White are co-coordinating SEN's project.

Up to 100 people and organizations will be profiled on the website. Sixteen people and organizations have already been selected for inclusion and are therefore not eligible for nomination. They are: Grey Owl, Anahareo, J. Stan Rowe, J. W. Grant MacEwan, Wallace Stegner, Richard St. Barbe Baker, Farley Mowat, John Macoun, W.O. Mitchell, Diana Wright, Stuart Houston, Prairie Farm Rehabilitation Act/Administration, Last Mountain Lake Bird Sanctuary, Nature Saskatchewan, the Shelterbelt Centre at Indian Head, and the Saskatchewan Soil Survey. Profiles of the above will be available on the SEN website in Fall 2005.

Historian, Bill Waiser, author of the commemorative publication for the provincial centennial, *Saskatchewan: A New History*, notes that "people need to be reminded how the diverse Saskatchewan environment and our love/hate relationship with it has shaped and influenced our history."

# Centennial Op-Ed *by Alan Appleby*

Happy 100<sup>th</sup> birthday, Saskatchewan! It is our centennial year, and like all significant anniversaries, it's a time to look back and celebrate where we've come from, and look forward to where we are going.

In the midst of all that pondering, lots of parties will have taken place, as they should be. The focus of Centennial celebrations seems to have been community events and projects, reunions and fun. That's great, and we've enjoyed the hot dogs and fireworks and have many great memories, lots of BBQ pictures and probably a few new plaques or statues.

But what has our centennial really been about? How have we honoured those hardy folks who founded this delightful province and helped give us the good life we have today? And what will we pass on to our descendants when they light the fireworks for the 200<sup>th</sup> birthday in 2105? Will we just pass on another generation of history books and photo albums? Will our legacy be museum artifacts in a time capsule and some yellowed pictures, or will it be something real, something the future citizens can enjoy and also pass on, and that all future generations will continue to enjoy?

Let's give the future a gift of life, a gift of nature, a gift of Saskatchewan. Let us pass on some wilderness to the future. Some wide open spaces, prairie and forest, un-ploughed, un-logged, un-mined, un-flooded. Let's give a gift that will be in essence one of the real reasons we live here - Saskatchewan's natural beauty. Take a look at the government's ads for the Centennial and you will see they agree in that most of the pictures are of places of natural beauty.

If we look back to the events of the past century, we see that each generation has left us a similar gift. Canada's first migratory bird sanctuary, Last Mountain Lake National Wildlife Area was created in 1887, during early pioneer days. Saskatchewan's first National Park, Prince Albert National Park was designated in 1927. One of the first acts the Saskatchewan Legislature undertook on receiving responsibility for Crown lands in 1931, was to create the provincial park system, and some of

our favourite recreations spots: Moose Mountain, Cypress Hills, and Duck Mountain. These were among the eight parks created in the "dirty thirties" when public attention was busy with many other problems resulting from the dust bowl and depression.

Tommy Douglas, recently named our most famous Canadian, was not just the father of universal health care. Tommy undertook a study of our recreation needs, and as a result gave us more great bits of nature to enjoy into the future: Meadow Lake, The Battlefords, and Pike Lake Provincial Parks, were just some of the six parks created on his careful watch.

Allan Blakeney continued the trend with Saskatchewan Landing, Danielson and Douglas Provincial Parks on the newly formed Diefenbaker Lake. And Grant Devine even as he championed a Saskatchewan that was "open for business" added to this legacy with Clearwater River Wilderness Park and Grasslands National Park. Roy Romanow added Athabasca Sand Dunes and Wildcat Hill Provincial Parks. But it has now been over ten years since Saskatchewan created a new provincial park.

Would we really be the same Saskatchewan without these delightful natural areas for camping, swimming, hunting, fishing, canoeing and lying on the beach? Surely we are all thankful for the foresight and wise legislative decisions that left us these gifts of nature in their original condition rather than turning them into more farms, more gravel pits, more saw logs. And just as surely we should think about how we can add to this natural legacy.

As we pause to thank those that came before for their many gifts, we should think about the many ways we can speak to future generations as wisely and beautifully. There is a lot of wild nature left in Saskatchewan, both north and south, but it is disappearing fast, under oil rigs and gas wells, and logging trucks and mining claims. Beautiful areas of nature are there as free gifts to ourselves and our descendants to enjoy forever.
